6. Monitoring and evaluation of learning outcomes

Each module is evaluated by a 100-point system. The maximum score is 100. A student is allowed to pass the final control if he has a total score in the discipline for the exam of 40 or more points, to offset 60 or more points.

Attendance - 20 points. For each unworked pass, 2 points are deducted.
